**Students to explore four-year degree options at annual Transfer Week**

Omaha, Neb.—Students interested in starting their education at Metropolitan Community College and transferring to a four-year college will have the opportunity to discuss their options during MCC's annual Transfer Week, Jan. 27–30. Representatives from 19 area colleges and universities will visit four Metropolitan Community College locations (Elkhorn Valley, Fort Omaha and South Omaha campuses and the Sarpy Center) during the four-day event.

"More than 10,000 MCC students have chosen degree tracks that will take them to a four-year school to finish a bachelor's degree," said Barry Anderson, coordinator of articulation and special programs. "Transfer Week makes it easy for students to explore their post-associate degree options and pursue their goals."
